Purpose:

"To build or expand the capacity of State Educational Agencies, in partnership with State Mental Health Agencies overseeing school-aged youth and with three local education agencies, to:

- increase awareness of mental health issues among school-aged youth
- 2) provide training for school personnel and other adults who interact with school-aged youth to detect and respond to mental health issues
- 3) connect school-aged youth, who may have behavioral health issues or serious mental illness and their families to needed services."

- In 2017, Wyoming's Suicide Rate was 4 times higher than the national average
- In the 2018 State Needs Assessment,
 Wyoming identified a need for additional support with Substance Abuse
 Treatment
- Pandemic: 93% increase in people taking online assessments for anxiety, 62% increase for depression assessments

- Access to care: Wyoming ranks 45th in the nation
- Combined, the Park, Fremont, and Campbell counties have a population of 12,943 students, with an approximate prevalence rate of 20%. Approximately, 2,499 students can benefit per year from this grant state-wide
- Maximized for care, there is the potential to provide \$1.1M in annual care state-wide

Grant Goals

(3-5 objectives per goal)

- 1. Increase access to mental health and substance abuse services for school aged youth.
- 2. Increase each LEA's student, parent, and family knowledge of mental health and substance abuse services available, develop student skills that will promote resilience, prosocial behaviors, and prevent youth violence through outreach, engagement, and training.
- 3. Increase each LEAs capacity to recognize and appropriately respond to mental health and substance abuse needs of students through professional development and training.
- **4.** Develop state and LEA level infrastructures to foster wellness in school-aged youth and their families.

- Training time
- Programs & trainings must be evidence-based
